

OBITUARY

Alamanzor Dickerson.

On June 4th, Alamanzor Dickerson passed away at his home at 264 Main street, after having passed about one-half of his eighty-four years as a resident of Hackettstown and vicinity. He was born in Chester in 1845, and was a member of one of the prominent families of that town.

He married Miss Caroline Pinkney of Newark and moved to School-eyes Mountain, then to Pleasant Grove, and then to the Mitchell farm at White Hall, Independence Township. He farmed for a number of years, after which he obtained employment with the D. L. & W. R. R., where he worked on the wood train until that was abandoned. Since then he has not had any steady employment.

He is survived by five sons and two daughters. He also had three sons and one daughter who are deceased. Those surviving are: Mrs. Jennie Mayberry of Red Bank, Samuel Paw of Freeport, L. I.; Harry, of Morristown. Mrs. Alice Smith, of Johnsonburg; Thomas, David and Vernon, of Hackettstown. One son, John C., was killed in the Spanish-American War.

The funeral will take place at his late home Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The Rev. J. M. Wilson, pastor of St. James' Episcopal Church, will officiate. Interment will be in Union Cemetery.
