CHARLES HARRIOUSE.

Charles Hairhouse, Hucketistown's old. est merchant, died suddenly last Souday night at his home from heart failure and the infirmities of old aged. He had been in his usual health, during the day and in the afternoon took a short automobile ride with his grandson. While sitting in his clinic just before retiring for the night he complained of teeling tired and died in a short time. He was born nearly eighty-live years ago in Roensahl, Westphalia, Prussia, and at the age of twentytwo came to America. For two years he was employed as a jeweler's assistant in Newton In March 1853, he came here and opened a jewelry storem the Rushog building now the Sharp building, ofposite the Warren House. For two years he occupied the building now owned by Frederick Kampt, the shoemaker: Fiftysix years ago he built the store room and house adjoining where he conducted business and died April 1st he retired from business after being the town's pioneer peweler for sixty-one years. June 1853, Mr. Hairhouse was married in New York City to Miss Matilda Maud, of Rocusald, Prussia, whose death occurred July 4, 1897. He is survived by one son, Charles P. Hairhouse, of Newark, and twordaughters, Mrs. George W. Smith and Mis. Charles Rutenhouse, of this place. Funeral services were held at his late home Wednesday afternoon.
