

Annette W. Hart

Services were held in Manasquan for Annette Wert Hart of Manasquan, who died Oct. 2 at the Sunnyside Farms Nursing Home, Wall Township.

She was born in Hackettstown where she lived most of her life, moving to Manasquan in 1965.

Self-employed as a musician, she taught piano and organ for over 50 years, retiring in 1985.

She was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Manasquan, the Governor William Livingston Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Spring Lake, and the National Huguenot Society.

Her husband, Robert O. Hart, died in 1973.

MANASQUAN — Robert O. Hart, 61, Holly Boulevard, a 35-year-old educator and author who had many friends in the Hackettstown area, died Tuesday, November 6, at Jersey Shore Medical Center in Neptune after a lengthy illness.

Born September 20, 1911, in Jersey City, Mr. Hart was a son of the late Raymond and Jennie Oberg Hart and had lived most of his life in Manasquan.

Mr. Hart received an A.B. degree in education from Rutgers University in 1933. He was an Army veteran of World

War II. He had taught social studies and languages in Asbury Park High School since 1946. He was the author of the book, "History of Russian Literature" and co-author of "Colored Culture." He was a member of the Evaluation of Education in Schools Committee.

Surviving is his widow, Mrs. Annette Wert Hart; and two brothers, Edward C. of Floral City, Fla. and John, Oxford.

Cremation was private. A memorial service was conducted on Saturday, November 10, at the First Presbyterian Church in Manasquan.
