

Kastenhuber suffers fatal heart attack

MANSFIELD TWP. — Township Deputy Mayor Walter A. Kastenhuber, 68, suffered a heart attack and died Friday night.

Kastenhuber was taken by Mansfield Rescue Squad to Hackettstown Community Hospital, where he died.

Mansfield Township Clerk Fredrick Perry said that the one thing Kastenhuber wanted was to see the Allen Road bridge repaired. "He saw that completed and got to cut the ribbon on it last week," Perry said. Kastenhuber presided over the ceremony due to Mayor Charles Rush being out of town, and was joined by local officials to reopen the bridge after it was closed one year.

In his 21 years on the township

committee, Kastenhuber served as police commissioner, as the committee representative to the Environmental Commission and the Planning Board, and headed the committees on roads and recreation. He also served as mayor for many years.

Kastenhuber was a member of the Independence Lodge 42, Free and Accepted Masons, and a charter member of the Tri-County Volunteer Fire Company. He served in

the U.S. Navy during World War II.

Survivors in addition to his wife, Beulah, are a son, Glenn L., of Hackettstown; two daughters, Linda Onorato of Lake Tranquility, and Tammy Chiu of Wilson, Pa.; three brothers, Harry, of Hackettstown, Robert, of Lexington, S.C., and Edward, of Reston, Va.; a sister, Jeanne Edwards of Hackettstown, and five grandchildren.

Services were held at Cochran Funeral Home Tuesday morning. Interment was at Pequest Union Cemetery in Great Meadows.
