HON. STEPHEN C. LARISON.

An Honored Citizen and Public Servant Passes Away.

Hon. Stephen C. Larison, one of our most respected citizens, died at his home on High street shortly before eight o'clock Wednesday morning. Death was the result of paraylsis with which he was stricken in his bathroom shortly after nine o'clock last Saturday night. Mr. Larison attended to his business dutles as usual on Saturday and was an interested spectator at the base ball game in the afternoon. He spent the evening with his family and started to retire about nine o'clock, going for his bath before retiring. It was nearly a half hour after he had entered the bathroom that his wife went to the room and found him unconscious in the tub. His eyes were closed and he was leaning heavily against the side but she noticed that he was still breathing and the neighbors were sent for as was Dr Martin. He was carried to his room but all efforts to arouse him were unavailing. The left side was complotoly paralized, and while there were tlashes of returning mental life, it is not thought that there was full consciousness up to the time of his death.

Mr. Larison had been in bad health for years, although able to give personal attention to the direction of all the details The conditions have of his business. been notably apoplectic and yet when the fear was realized it came as a shock to the community of which he was one of its most honored citizens. Mr. Larison was born in Morris county on October 16th, 1836, but his mature life has been He was for spent in Hackettstown. years owner and operator of what was then known as the Croton mill, and afterwards purchased the coal pusiness which he has since conducted.

He was actively and honorably con nected with the public affairs of the Town, county and State, lle was a member of Common Council for a term of years and in 1816 was elected a member of the County Board of Precholders, serving in that capacity until 1882. was a dominent factor in the Board, taking a prominent part in the reform movement that culminated two years later to the unparalled exposure of official rotton The exposure dependent on the election of a Director of the Board in 1878 and Mr. Larison was the candidate of the resirmers and was elected. He was the storm center in that upheaval and performed his duty with marked intelligence and effectiveness. His prominence in the Board made him the logical candidate of his party for Member of Assembly in 1882 and he was elected by the small margin of 58 votes in the hardest legislative contest in the history of the county. He was re-elected for the full term permitted by party usage and be served his State with marked fidelity and intelligence.

Some years after his retirement from active politics he was chosen a member of the State Board of Edwarten serving in that capacity for several years. His greatest public service to the Town, however, has been in connection with the public water supply. He has been a member of the Board of Water Commissioners for twenty add years, and during most of that long and honorable s rvice has been president of the Board. To no other public service has he given more, of his time and business talents. He was devoted to and enamered of his position and the highly satisfactory condition of that important branch of the public ser-

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
