

**HOWARD M. LISK**  
**HACKETTSTOWN**  
 Howard M. Lisk, of 401 East  
 Baldwin Street, 62-year-old  
 owner of the Hackettstown  
 insurance agency which bears  
 his name, died Monday at  
 Hackettstown Community  
 Hospital after a brief illness.  
 Services were conducted  
 yesterday (Wednesday) at  
 Metzler Funeral Home in  
 Hackettstown by the Rev.  
 William Orr of the Centenary  
 College faculty with interment  
 in Hackettstown Union  
 Cemetery.

Born March 27, 1911, in  
 Netcong, he was a son of the  
 late Frank and Louise Ben-  
 demore Lisk. He had lived in  
 Stanhope before moving to  
 Hackettstown 25 years ago.

A graduate of the New York  
 Electrical School, Mr. Lisk was  
 employed with Bell Telephone  
 Laboratories from 1929 to 1931  
 and then established his own  
 heating and oil burner business,  
 which he operated for the next  
 10 years. From 1941 to 1944 he  
 was engaged in installing  
 machinery for the Defense  
 Plant Corporation and from  
 1944 to 1946 was employed in  
 experimental work in radar  
 with Bell Labs.

Mr. Lisk re-established his  
 heating and oil burner business  
 in 1960 and continued operating  
 the insurance agency which he  
 established in 1958.

He served as a member of the  
 Stanhope Board of Education  
 from 1940 through 1942. He was  
 a member of the Hackettstown  
 Boy Scout Troop 150 Committee  
 in 1948 and 1949 and served as  
 chairman latter year. He had  
 been a member of the First  
 Presbyterian Church in  
 Hackettstown.

Active in Democratic politics,  
 Mr. Lisk served for many years  
 as a local member of the county  
 committee, and he was an  
 unsuccessful candidate for  
 Common Council on three oc-  
 casions.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs.  
 Edna Albright Lisk; three sons,  
 Howard M., Jr., and Thomas  
 Edward A. of Washington and  
 Robert K. of New York City;  
 two daughters, Mrs. Mary  
 Lake Stephens, of Washington,  
 and seven grandchildren.
