Man has heart attack and dies

HACKETTSTOWN - A Hackettstown man died Monday evening after he suffered a heart attack and was involved in a motor vehicle accident.

George D. Mayberry, 88, was traveling north on Grand Avenue at approximately 5:10 p.m. when he apparently suffered a heart attack. His car struck a vehicle parked on the side of the road and came to rest in front of the home of William and Lorraine Skeaham.

Mr. Skeaham left the house and went to Mayberry's vehicle. Mayberry was breathing erratically and not responding to Skeaham's questions.

Mrs. Skeaham, a registered nurse, assisted Patrolman James Erdman in performing first aid on Mayberry until the emergency personnel arrived.

Hackettstown First Aid and Rescue Squad and the Mobile Intensive Care Unit assisted at the scene and transported Mayberry to Hackettstown Community Hospital, where he was pronounced dead by emergency room personnel at 6:05 p.m.

Services were held for George D. Mayberry, 88, of Hackettstown, who died suddenly at Hackettstown Community Hospital Jan. 7.

He was born in Newark and lived in the Hackettstown area most of

his life.

He was a bookkeeper in the accounting department of American Sawmill in Hackettstown; treasurer of American Woodworking of Hackettstown; and a bookkeeper for Kinsey Oil of Hackettstown, retiring several years ago.

He was a member of Trinity United Methodist Church, Hackettstown; Mansfield Lodge #36 F&AM, Washington; Hackettstown Community Band and the Blue Ridge Drum and Bugle Corps of Hackettstown. He was a charter member of the Hackettstown Rescue Squad and former bookkeeper of the Hackettstown Parking Authority.

His wife, Celia Kinsey Mayberry,

died in 1983.

He is survived by several nieces and nephews.

Interment was in Union Cemetery, Hackettstown. The Cochran Funeral Home of Hackettstown was in charge of arrangements.
