George McCracken was born on the Dellicker farm on the Schooley Mountain road on July 4th, 1840, the sen of William and Anna C. McCracken. His father for a long time kept the Warren House, in Hackettsown. There were fourteen children of this couple, of whom twelve grew up to adult life. The children still living are Rhuel S. McCracken, proprietor of the American House; Mrs. Joseph D. Klotz. of High street:

Mr. McCracken entered public life in his native county of Morris by becoming Collector of Randolph Township in 1886. He afterward was County Collector. He became Mayor of Dover in 1893. He afterward was appointed Postmaster of Dover by President Cleveland.

Mr. McCracken's early career was in the carriage business in Hackettstown and Dover. Mr. McCracken leaves a widow, a daughter and a grandaughter.
