Actress, Politician Jewel Miller Dies

Izetta Jewel Miller, once the nation's highest paid actress and a women's rights activist, died yesterday at the age of 94.

In 1920, she became the first woman ever to second a presidential nomination at a national convention. In 1930 she was the Democratic nominee to Congress from her district in West Virgina.

Twice earlier, she ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. Senate as the first soman from the South to win a major party's nomination.

A. Arly as 1913, she was active in women's rights and helped found Actor's Equity.

Amative of Hackettstown, N.J., she began her acting career at the age of 15 maleston. She became the leading of the ideal theater in Washington D.C.

was watching her perform when he was told the Titanic was sinking. He stayed in the audience. President Woodrow Wilson described ther publicly as his favorite actiess.

She was featured in the firplay ever televised in 1928.

In 1914, she was married to a West Virginia congressman William G. Brown, Jr., who died swo years later, leaving her with their infant daughter and \$3.5 million.

In 1925, she married How G Miller, dean of engineer at George Washington University When he went to Union Course Schenectady, NY, she was sent the city's commissioner of producwelfare.

Miller, a retired Air Force lieutenant colonel, died in 1965 after they moved to Sauthern California.
