Services Are Held For Norman Tynan

Funeral services for Norman P. Tynan, Sr., veteran Hackettstown businessman and former fire chief, were held at 2 p. m. today at the First Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Tynan died of a heart attack Sunday, April 30, 1961, at his home at 506 Warren Street. He was 55.

He had been associated with his brother, John, in the Tynan Brothers Meat Market at 185 Main Street for the past 33 years. He served as Hackettstown fire chief in 1949 and 1950.

Born in Hackettstown on October 30, 1905, Mr. Tynan was the son of the late John and Henrietta Park Tynan.

As a young man he was employed for four years with the late Nathan Klotz, one of the founders of the Klotz & Ackley meat market founded in 1872. On May 5, 1928, Norman Tynan was joined by his brother, John M. Tynan, in buying out the Main Street market which they have since operated as Tynan Brothers.

35 Years As Fireman

Long active as a fireman, Mr. Tynan joined Cataract Hose Company 35 years ago and was a life member. He was also a member of the Exempt Firemen's Association and the Past Chief's Association.

He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church and a honorary member of General Torbitt Circle, Grand Army of the Republic, Hackettstown.

Surviving are his wife, Mildred Smith Tynan and one son, Norman P., Jr., at home; two daughters, Mrs. Henrietta Ackerman of Drakestown and Mrs. Betty Claus of Hackettstown; three brothers, Milton J., Frank W. and John M., all of Hackettstown and six grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements were made in the Cochran Funeral Home, Hackettstown. Services were conducted by Rev. August J. Kling, pastor. Burial was in Hackettstown Union Cemetery.
