Mr. O'Dowd was one of the founding members of the Livestock Cooperative Auction Market Association of Northwest Jersey at Hackettstown in 1940. He was a director of the market until his retirement from farming in 1953, and he served as president of the highly successful cooperative fron 1945 thru 1948.

His interest in livestock continued when he moved from the farm to Fairview Avenue, where for many years he stabled horses and ponies, chiefly for the enjoyment of children. He was the friend of hundreds of children also as the driver of a Washington Township school bus from 1955 until 1968.

Mir. O Dowd was married in Caldwell on April 29, 1920, to Miss Margaret Gearty of Verona. The couple celebrated their 50 wedding anniversary with a mass at Our Eady of the Mountain Church and a reception for 200 relatives and friends at the Schooley's Mountain Community House in 1970.

Beside his wife, Mr. O Dowd leaves two daughters, Mrs. Mary Darter, head nurse of the Washington Township Schools at Long Valley, and Mrs. Peggy O'Dowd, a teacher in the New York City school system. He also leaves five grandchildren and a sister, Mrs. Agnes Healy of Scotch Plains.
