HARRY OSMUN A SUIGIDE

Son of Old Local Family Ends Life in Newark by Inhading Gas.

Air Harry C. Osmun, son of an old Ha kettstown family, committed sulcide at his home in Newark, Wedneeday night, and his body will be I rought here for berial tomorrow. I e had been living and doing busiress in Newark for a dozen years. 1 aking his home with the family of Henry D. Fitts. He left the family circle about 8 o'clock and retired to his room, and there was nothing hi is demeanor to indicate his desperrte determination. It was thought t at he had retired to dress previous to going out. Failing to return in a reaconable time occasioned comment, end as Mr. Fitts approached the room he smell of gas ca sed apprehension. When he opened the door he found Mr. Osmun fully dressed on the bed with a rubber tube attached to his mouth. The heart was paralyzed with the first two or three inhalations of the illuminating gas.

He left a note on his bureau confiming his suicidal purpose. He similar requested that a funeral service be held at the Newark residence Friday night and that his body be brought to Hackettstown on Saturday for interment beside his father, and mother, and that only a brief service be held at the grave,

Mr. Osmun was the son of the late Joseph Osmun. He was born grew to manhood here. He inherited a fair start in business life branched out as a speculator in Wall street, and was cleaned out finan ially. He later established a profitable mail order business in Newark and was believed to have recuperated his losses and to be in comfortable financ'al circumstan es. There is no confirmation in the rumor that he had returned to the speculative game and was discouraged because of recent severe losses. He was 52 years old and rnmarried. His aunt. Mrs. Hattle Coleman of Hackettstown, is nearest surviving relative.
