John C. Kennedy Called by Death

Longtime Resident Active in Both Church and Civic Affairs

Death early Monday morning removed from the community John Chapin Kennedy, another of Hackettstown's aged and favorably known citizens. For more than len days he had been critically ill at his Main street home. Preceding weeks there had been a general physical decline, noticeable to those by whom he was best known.

Mr. Kennedy was born in New York September 13, 1855. Early in life he came here with his parrents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Kennedy, who creeded the home now known as "Goodland," over in Morris County.
