Retired Lt.C.A. Rfeiffer Dead; Funeral Today

Flemington in 1934, died sud-denly Monday evening after being stricken at his home, 220 Grand Avenue. He was in his 76th year.

Lt. Pfeiffer served 26 years in the State Police and was in command of District B-6, covering the stations at Net-Hainesville, when he reached the compulsory retirement age of 55 in 1953. Subsequently he was employed for a few years at Centerary College for Women. He had made his home in Hackettstown since 1929.

The State Police organization was only six years old when Lt. Pfeiffer enlistend on Mar. 15, 1927, and took his training in the 14th class to go through the

Handled Lindbergh Crowd

Earning his corporal's stripe, he had brief assignments at the Ramsey, Waldwick Pompton Lakes before he was sent to Flemington in July of cong, Newton, Sussex and 1932 for what proved to be an unusually long command of 15 years, during which he was promoted to sergeant.

Lt. Pfeiffer had been in the Hunterdon Countyseat only a couple of years when the arrest of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for the Lindbergh baby murder in late September of 1934 made that small community the center of world attention. Hauptmann was moved from the Bronx to Flemington in October and was tried the January following February, bringing mobs of curious persons who over-ran the town. Much of the detail of handling the crowds and other phases in connection with guarding the prisoner and the trial itself fell upon Lt. Pfeiffer and his contingent of troopers, although a large supplemental force of State Police was brought in for the special duty.

Featured In Magazine A degree of notoriety came to Lt. Pfeiffer in the mid-1940's when a nationally-circulated detective magazine carried a feature story on the part he played in solution of a double murder near Frenchtown.

High School Athelete Born Oct. 11, 1898, at Krasby in Middlesex County; Lt. Pfeiffer was a son of the late Charles and Mary Bertran Pfeiffer. He was a graduate of Woodbridge High School, where he starred in baseball — a sport he continued in amateur ranks after his school days.

During World War I he had a year of active duty with the Naval Reserve, and he was employed by the United States Lead Company before joining the State Police.

Lt. Pfeiffer was a 32nd degree Mason, a member of Americus Lodge No. 83, Woodbridge, and the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, Valley Trenton He also belonged to the Association of Former New Jersey Troopers.
