#### HAPPENINGS AT THE MUSEUM

A town VIP of sorts stopped by the museum while visiting her birthplace in December. Catherine Ann Disbrow of Ontario, Canada holds the distinction of being the first baby born in the new Hackettstown Community Hospital when it opened in 1973.

In November we received an inquiry from Richard Doerner, a museum specialist in the Office of the Senate Curator in Washington, D.C. They are in the process of restoring some Senate office chairs that were purchased in the 1950s. They were originally upholstered with leather from the **Lackawanna Leather Company** in Hackettstown. Mr. Doerner was pleased that we were able to supply him with sample information for three of the four colors they were seeking.


During the fall the **Display Committee** put the finishing touches on exhibits dedicated to the town's former businesses. Since the Museum's re-opening we have received visitors' compliments on the new displays and the increased exhibit signage. The **Display Committee** should take pride in their fine efforts!

Activities have continued elsewhere in the museum. With the help of volunteer **Maureen Lyons** work has resumed on updating our inventory of houses and buildings in the Historic District. Almost six hundred pages have recently been added to these binders, which continue to be a valuable resource for those seeking information about their home's age, architecture, or prior ownership.

In August a small collection of history books from the estate of **Robert Stiff** was gifted to the museum's **reference library**. Speaking of books, three recent additions to the library are of particular interest: *The Story of Waterloo Village from Colonial Forge to Canal Town* by John R. Giles, *A History of the Andover Iron Works*, and *The Morris Canal and the Age of Ingenuity*, the latter two by Kevin W. Wright.

New accessions include a wicker baby carriage, an unusual baby pull cart, and a patent model for a railroad car coupling device. These items, on loan since the 1970s, have been donated by their owners and are now part of the permanent museum collection.

#### **The Skinner Brothers**

This familiar monument in Union Cemetery commemorates the sacrifice of two brothers who were the only Hackettstown residents to lose their lives in the Spanish American War. It was dedicated on Memorial Day, May 30, 1916.

William K. Skinner and Lewis B. Skinner were two of the seven children of Albert H. and Christie Ann (Bowlby) Skinner. The family moved to Hackettstown in 1888 when Professor Albert Skinner became principal of the Hackettstown Public School. William and Lewis attended Hackettstown High School, graduating in 1894 and 1895 respectively. William's activities after graduation are not known. Lewis attended the Centenary Collegiate Institute, graduating in 1896. After brief periods of employment, the two brothers joined the U. S. Army in 1897.

The United States declared war on Spain on April 25, 1898 following the sinking of the Battleship USS *Maine* in Havana Harbor, Cuba on February 15, 1898. Among the many reasons for the war, the two primary ones are America's support of the ongoing struggle by Cubans and Filipinos against Spanish rule, and the mysterious explosion of the USS *Maine*. While questions remain to this day as to the actual cause of the sinking of the *Maine*, it nevertheless contributed to the declaration of war. The Spanish-American war ended with the signing of the Treaty of Paris on December 10, 1898.

Private Lewis B. Skinner died on July 1, 1898 during a three-day battle at Santiago, Cuba. He was a member of Company B, 71<sup>st</sup> New York Volunteers. William K. Skinner died on April 25, 1899 in continued fighting in the Philippines. He was a member of the cavalry and was killed instantly while trying to recover his horse that had broken loose and run towards enemy lines.



#### IN MEMORIUM



**Dr. Henry P. Shotwell IV**, 77, passed away on January 14, 2022. He was born at the US Naval Hospital, Brooklyn, grew up in Staten Island, NY and most recently lived in Independence Township. At the time of his passing Hank was a semi-retired Senior Health and Safety consultant with HP Shotwell. He was a Certified Industrial Hygienist and held a PhD in safety engineering. His lengthy career in environmental, health, and safety fields included clinical experience at the Yale Arbovirus Research Unit, where he did research on dengue fever. Hank also worked at the 9/11 site assisting with air quality monitoring. A man of varied interests, "Major Shotwell" was a Civil War reenactor with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Rhode Island Company B Regiment based in NJ.
